HISTORY

RDN was founded in November 2019 to respond to the need for effective representation and engaged involvement in enhancing the vitality and supporting the development of English-speaking communities across Québec that work within a defined territory.

The organizations serving these communities face multiple socio-economic challenges in fulfilling their mandates. Often portrayed as generalist organizations, they face funding constraints while dealing with community needs and issues in multiple sectors, within numerous jurisdictions, and in a minority language setting that is often not recognized. In addition, many organizations must carry out their work over a large territory while serving isolated populations. In this context, it was determined that there is a need for a network of regional organizations serving the English-speaking communities of Québec for the purposes of networking, collaboration, and representation to support the individual organizations in the work they endeavour to carry out.

Since 2019, we've done the following:


- Grown from 9 founding member organizations to a group of 18, now covering 12 out of Québec's 17 administrative regions.
- Established collaborative relationships with CDRQ; CHSSN; the Consortium of English-language CEGEPs, Colleges and Universities of Quebec; Éducaloi; ELAN; Literacy Quebec; PERT; Place aux jeunes en région; QUESCREN; SEIZE; Y4Y; and YES.
- Consulted with membership to set priorities for 2022 to 2025.
- Added to our team to now have 7 full-time employees.
- Launched SEEnet, an initiative to promote the social economy among the Englishspeaking community of the province of Québec.
- Renewed SRQEA funding for Core, Employabilty, the social economy initiative, and ERCC.



RDN PROGRAMS

Core

The RDN Core program provides members with a strong, informed, and well-structured backbone organization engaged in increasing the recognition of regional English-speaking community needs within programs offered by governments and other sources. Network members receive support for their development of organizational capacity and stakeholder relations and the creation of strategic partnerships. To accomplish this, RDN engages in a variety of consultative processes to capture the needs and priorities of members and to communicate them to the appropriate funding body or government. This program has been made possible with the financial support of the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise.





Enhancing Regional Community Capacity (ERCC) Phase 2

Funded by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise, RDN is participating in the implementation of Phase 2 of the Enhancing Regional Community Capacity (ERCC) initiative. The program aims to extend the mandates of English-speaking community regional organizations, cover more territory through the creation of satellite offices, strengthen capacity, and develop relationships with government entities and actors within the Francophone community. RDN supports beneficiary organizations through project management assistance, organizational development, training, and networking. RDN works collaboratively with the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise to establish strategic relationships between beneficiary organizations and government actors.

SEEnet

<u>SEEnet</u>—the Social Solidarity Economy English-Speaking Network—is RDN's social economy initiative. Funded by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise, SEEnet was started to increase the participation of Québec's English speakers in the social solidarity economy.

SEEnet strategically mobilizes community knowledge, leverages available resources, and builds capacity for English-speaking communities to implement innovative projects. We offer workshops, consultations, internships, and mentoring to both cooperatives and not-for-profit organizations for long-term growth. By building strong connections and province-wide partnerships, SEEnet helps advance innovative projects that increase economic and social opportunities within English-speaking communities.





Employment Strategy 2022–2024

The Employment Strategy program strives to address the issue of English speakers, especially youth, struggling to integrate into Québec's labour force despite having adequate levels of education and vocational training. This is partly because members of these communities don't take full advantage of the employment services available to them and, conversely, organizations providing these employment services aren't always able to serve an English-speaking clientele.

RDN acts as fiduciary to 12 English-language regional organizations in Québec; it manages, monitors, and evaluates the regional projects and communicates their results. The Employment Strategy program has been made possible with the financial support of the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise.





Community Mobilization Project 2023–2025

The Community Mobilization Project provides legal information to RDN's member organizations, their communities, and the public. A collaboration with Éducaloi, the Community Mobilization Project has been funded by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise.

The project goals are to enhance the knowledge of English-speaking Québecers about legal topics in daily life, to enhance the ability of English-speaking Québecers to take action regarding legal issues in daily life, to enhance the organizations' capacity to provide legal information and referrals to appropriate legal resources, and to promote Éducaloi's online and print resources. RDN and Éducaloi offer six legal information legal workshops a year on topics requested by RDN member organizations.





French for the Workforce

Open to English speakers from all over Québec, French for the Workforce focuses on helping participants improve their French in order to advance their careers. Participants work on their CVs, cover letters, job interview skills, and ability to use industry terminology. Participants will practice verb conjugations, have group discussions, and receive personalized feedback to track their progress. A collaboration with PERT and YES, French for the Workforce is funded by the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois d'expression anglaise.





Who We Are, What We Do Video Capsule Project

Who We Are, What We Do is a two-year project to design and produce two-and-a-half-minute bilingual corporate video capsules for RDN's eighteen regional member organizations serving the English-speaking minority community of Québec.

The video capsules will help the organizations leverage funding, expand their partnerships, and reach new communities. By presenting key facts about each region, foregrounding positive and distinct aspects of each community, and offering a succinct but impressive overview of each regional organization's activities, the videos will inform or remind viewers of the presence and vitality of the English-speaking minority community of Québec.
