Most English-mother tongue Quebecers CAN SPEAK FRENCH...

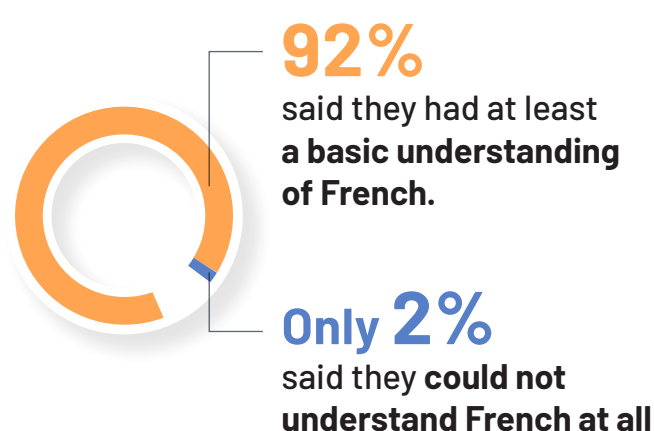
English-mother tongue Quebecers represent:



71%

of English-mother tongue Quebecers can speak both English and French

Among English-speaking survey respondents from Quebec:



AND MOST USE IT!

65% of English-mother tongue workers in Quebec regularly use French at work

OVER HALF of English-mother tongue school-aged children in Quebec have French as a language of instruction at school

Among those Quebecers who have both English and French as mother tongues,

87% regularly speak French at home

69% of children in English-French households in Quebec have French as a mother tongue

76% of English-speaking Quebecers have contact with Francophones at least once a week...

And the vast majority of interactions ARE POSITIVE!

Most English-speaking Quebecers APPRECIATE FRENCH-LANGUAGE CULTURE



55% are interested in French-language cultural products, such as books, music, film or television



58% attend French-language arts and cultural events, such as shows, festivals or exhibitions

- special interests

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Notes:

The term "Anglophone" and "English-speaking" are used interchangeably for the purposes of this infographic. "Anglophones" refers to individuals whose preferred Canadian official language is English, including people who may have English as a mother tongue, but also people whose mother tongue(s) may be another language but who consider English to be their preferred official language.
